BTC, started in 2017 by Marquette Brink, is a South Dakota-based company that offers educational and tutoring services for a wide variety of subjects. The company focuses on the learning process for a variety of students that require a different approach. Our students may include high achievement scholars that are looking for an edge; students who are struggling to learn within the confines of public-school parameters; and those students who for many reasons need a faith-based solution to keep them on track.

BTC relies on a faith-based learning platform that integrates Religion, Mathematics, Reading, Writing, Grammar, History, Science, Music, friendships, serving others, and clean-up tasks into the daily routine. We continue the vision of cultivating character and improving the academic potential of every student to impact the world for Christ in K – 12th grades.

Educational Philosophy

BTC exists to equip children to view life from God's perspective because He is Truth (John 14:6). We believe Biblical perspective is communicated through 1.) His Creation, 2.) His Son, Jesus Christ, and 3.) His Holy Word, the Bible. All Truth is rooted in the Bible (John 17:17), therefore Christ and the Bible are central and embedded into every subject and activity. Our school will not teach anything or incorporate any content into the curriculum that we deem to be inconsistent with our Biblical worldview, our Statement of Faith, and our commitment to be a distinctively Christian school in every way. We will teach our students how to discern the truth and how to train their minds for excellence.

Our responsibility to the students encompasses the spiritual, intellectual, physical, social, and emotional areas of their lives. As students recognize God's Truth and are assured of their calling and election, they also will recognize the worth God has placed on them and how they can live in a manner worthy of the gospel.

We believe that a proper relationship between family, church, and school is essential to Christian education. It is the responsibility of parent(s) to teach and train their child(ren); BTC is an extension of the educational process of the home, partnering with families as they raise their child(ren) in a countercultural manner that honors and glorifies God and encourages a personal and growing relationship with Christ (Gal 1:10). Together, BTC and parent(s) partner in providing an education that is both Christian and challenging, equipping students to know, love, and practice that which is true, virtuous, and beautiful, and which challenges them to strive for excellence as they live for the glory of God and the good of all people.

As Christian educators, we desire to be faithful in communicating a Godly vision that inspires our child(ren) to walk in the freedom and openness of the Gospel, and in so doing, influence the world for Christ (John 15:19, John 9:5). BTC grounds everything we do on the transforming power of the Gospel of Jesus Christ to instill in our students, families, and staff an eternal mindset based on God's absolute truth.

We support the family of each student and respect the churches that are represented at BTC. We believe that the Bible is the infallible Word of God, and we study the Word at each level of education. BTC is a non-denominational school. Currently our staff and students represent over five different churches. BTC is not associated with any church or denomination or groups using the facilities.

BTC Statement of Faith

1. BTC believes that the Bible is God's indisputable message to man, that it is inspired by God himself and, therefore, is without error. II Peter 1:20-21, II Tim. 3:15-17
2. BTC believes there is one God who continuously and endlessly evidences Himself in three persons: God the Father, God the Son (Jesus), and God the Holy Spirit. Genesis 1:1, Matt 28:19, John 10:30
3. BTC believes that Jesus Christ is the Son of God and He is one with the Father. John 1:1, Isaiah 43:10-13, John 17:20-21, John 10:30, Luke 3:21-22
4. BTC believes that Jesus was born of a virgin, that He lived a sinless life, and that He accomplished amazing miracles, as recorded in Scripture. Isaiah 7:14, Matt 1:18-23, Hebrews 4:15, I Peter 1:18-19
5. BTC believes that Jesus shed His blood and died on the cross as our substitute and, in so doing, settled the score once and for all for our sin. Isaiah 53:4-6, Romans 6:23, Gal. 1:4, Romans 5:8, Romans 3:22-24
6. BTC believes in the miraculous resurrection of Jesus and that He ascended to the right hand of God the Father where He constantly intercedes on our behalf and that one day He will return to earth in power and glory. Hebrews. 7:26, John 5:28-29, John 11:25, Mark 16:19, Romans 8:26-34, I Thess. 4:16, Hebrews. 4:15.
7. BTC believes that through a personal heart-felt acceptance of Jesus Christ as personal Savior, we are reborn as a new creation by the inner working of the Holy Spirit. John 5:24, Eph. 2:4-9, Titus 3:5-7, Romans 5:8-9, Romans 10:9-10, Eph. 1:13-14, John 14:6.
8. BTC believes that the Holy Spirit indwells the Christian and encourages us to live a Godly life. John 16:11, Romans 8:13-26, John 14:26, I Cor. 3:16, Hebrews. 4:15
9. BTC believes in the resurrection of the dead for both the believer and the non-believer; those that are saved unto eternal life in heaven and the unsaved to eternal damnation in hell. I John 5:11, Romans 8:11, I Cor. 15:42-49, John 5:28-29.
10. BTC believes in the spiritual unity of believers in our Lord Jesus Christ and pledge to look beyond doctrinal conflict in order that the kingdom of God be extended. Gal. 3:26-28, Eph. 4:4-6, I Cor. 12:1-14, Phil. 2:1-5.
11. BTC believes that all human life is sacred and created by God in His image and His likeness. Human life is of inestimable worth in all its dimensions, including pre-born babies, the aged, the physically or mentally challenged, and every other stage or condition from conception through natural death. Gen. 1:27-28, Jer., 1:4-5, Psalms. 139: 13-16

12. BTC believes that God wonderfully and immutably creates each person as male or female, therefore: alternative gender identities are contrary to the Bible. Male and female are distinct, complementary genders that together reflect the image and nature of God. BTC will use gender appropriate pronouns reflecting gender at birth as well as legally assigned names. Parent(s) may notify the school of appropriate nicknames students would like to be called by. Gen. 1:26-27, Gen. 2:15-24, Lev. 20:13a, Matt. 19:4
13. BTC believes that God created marriage to be exclusively the union of one man and one woman, and that intimate sexual activity is to occur exclusively within that union. Gen. 2:22-24, 1 Corin. 7:2-5, Matt. 19: 4-6, Rom. 1:26-27

I understand that the BTC will address spiritual matters using this statement as a basis and guide. The Statement of Faith does not exhaust the extent of our beliefs. The Bible itself, as the inspired and infallible Word of God that speaks with final authority concerning truth, morality, and the proper conduct of mankind, is the sole and final source of all that we believe. For purposes of the BTC's faith, doctrine, practice, policy, and discipline, our Board of Directors is the BTC final interpretive authority on the Bible's meaning and application.

BTC Objectives

Our core value (C.A.R.E.) is the method we use to obtain our objectives. The following objectives of the BTC are founded on the Word of God, Statement of Faith, school philosophy, vision, mission, purpose, and goals. "For no other foundation can anyone lay than that which is laid, which is Jesus Christ." (1 Corinthians 3:11)

BTC takes hold of the responsibility of shaping a Christian mind, cultivating a Christian heart, and promoting Christian service – head, heart, and hands, thinking, feeling, and doing – all intertwined in each person. The formation of the whole child with humble, selfless, Christ-focused ambitions: this is the vision of our school. (Philippians 2:1-9).

Educational Statement of Beliefs

BTC is committed to academic excellence within a Christ-centered community: shaping Christian minds, cultivating Christian hearts, and promoting Christian service. The ultimate goal of Christian education is the glorification of God, accomplished by bringing students to a personal relationship with Jesus Christ, which leads them to imitate Him while fully utilizing their God-given gifts to serve Him and His people.

 - Serve as an extension of learning environment at home, working with parent(s) to shape the hearts of students as we all seek to imitate Christ

School Governance

A Board of Director's governs BTC. The Board is responsible for maintaining and clarifying the school vision/mission, making policies, approving the budget and curricula, and is the final authority. The administrator works with the Board to implement policy and manage the daily operation of the school.

Section 1 – Admission/Tuition Information

A. Admission Policy

BTC strongly desires that young people have an opportunity to receive a Christian education, but presently the school is unable to meet the needs of students with the following and will be determined on individual basis:

- Low academic performance as indicated by a standardized test and/or previous school records or special education classes.
- Serious emotional or behavioral problems
- A physical handicap which would impair the learning process

Attendance at the BTC is a privilege. Students who agree with the BTC Statement of Faith will be considered for admission. It shall be the policy and practice of BTC, in the admission of its students, not to discriminate based on the applicant's race, color, national or ethnic origin.

B. Student Application Process

BTC offers a program for students who desire an education in a Christian environment and who are capable of achievement in a program dedicated to academic excellence.

Application process:

1. Submission of a properly completed and signed Enrollment Application with the enrollment fee.
2. A parent and student interview with the administrator. The student may attend the interview or be interviewed by the administrator later. The administrator may contact the student's previous school to ascertain past conduct, academic progress, and long-term potential.

The interview assures that:

- At least one parent expresses a clear testimony of Christian faith.
 - The parent(s) desire a Christian education for their child(ren).
 - The family beliefs are consistent with the Statement of Faith and the philosophy of the school.
 - The child expresses a desire to attend the school and agrees to live in harmony with school standards and policies.
3. An evaluation for all new students will be given for all new kindergarten – 12th grade students. The Renaissance STAR Reading, Math, and Accelerated testing will be used along with a writing portion deemed by the teacher. The report card and latest State testing will also be reviewed.
 4. Students transferring from an accredited or non-accredited institution must provide a recent report card, national norm test score from the current or previous school year, as well as scope and sequence and objectives covered by each course for credit transfer in Language Arts and Math.
 5. Students who have taken and passed courses not provided by BTC will receive credit for those courses.

BTC believes that providing a solid foundation in the areas of Language Arts and Math are key to future success, and it is in each student's best interest to fill any gaps in these two areas before moving ahead.

If the above requirements cannot be provided to demonstrate mastery, or in the case of low scores on report card (less than a C) or low standardized test scores (below 55%), the student will be tested.

- The Student Application form is available from the BTC office.
- New students will be given an evaluation before school starts and will be subject to a two-week diagnostic and probationary period.
- All parents & students must agree with the Statement of Faith and all school policies and procedures as stated in the Parent/Student Handbook.
- Any applicant denied admission will receive a refund of his/her enrollment fee.

C. Tuition and Fee Policy

Tax dollars do not support private Christian schools. Therefore, tuition payments and gift contributions are vital to meet financial obligations. Tuition and fees will be reviewed on an annual basis and will be set in after January by the BTC Board.

Families who have two or more students attending BTC can receive a multiple student discount upon request on Tuition cost for the year. Families may choose to “give back” this discount at the time of enrollment. Tuition “give back” is applied to teacher compensations.

Grades K-8

The monthly cost for a student is **\$428.48 per month** for half day per student plus a **\$412 curriculum fee** per student per year. The curriculum fee is used for books, science items, online subscriptions, and assessments. There are family discounts available. Monthly tuition is due at the beginning of each month. Please see the tuition schedule.

Throughout the year, you may be asked to send money for a special lunch, learning project or field trip.

Grades 9-12

Parents and students are responsible for purchasing the educational curriculum we decide is the best for their style of learning and will be ultimately responsible for the completion of each subject/grade.

Staff at BTC will help mentor, organize, grade, and offer structure for independent learning.

\$343.33 per month for traditional curriculum will be due to BTC for this service. Online High

School monitoring will be **\$389.08 per month**. Please see the tuition schedule.

General Financial Policies

Tuition Payment Reminders will be sent via e-mail 5 days before your payment is due. The due date on tuition payments is the 15th of each month.

Finance charges will be assessed at 18% APR on balances over 30 days past due.

A 3rd party collection agency may be used on invoices for 2mo. past due and service will pause until account is current.


Tuition Refund

Section 2 - Academics Offered

It is our desire to meet the ever-increasing educational needs of our community. BTC offers several program options. Current program offerings are listed below. Program options may be added or deleted as the need dictates.

On-Campus Study Program

Our On-Campus Study Program is a four day a week program. Our K-8 program will provide instruction in all core academic areas plus Bible, Art, PE, STEM and service projects. High School students will receive guidance in independent learning for Language Arts, Math, Science, History and Computer. Electives may be completed during the afternoon or at home. A certified teacher will be available for assistance at any time for those electives.

Online Academy Program

Students can enroll full-time in the Online Academy Program. Students receive appropriate placement in the online curriculum and can complete courses towards an accredited diploma. Online Academy graduation requirements are the same as students who attend on campus classes. Students will work with the distant coordinator to develop their own individual education plan. It is the responsibility of the parent(s) to ensure that students are working and keeping up with timelines. The distant coordinator is available during regular school hours to assist, or problem solve in any area needed. All online students can participate in any or all extra-curricular or special activities that BTC may have.

Concurrent/Dual Credit College Enrollment Program

Select upper-level students may opt to take courses at a community college while enrolled at BTC. With administrative approval, college courses fulfill credits toward graduation.

Curriculum

Students in grades 9-12 will be self-learners with support from the teachers at BTC. Students and parent(s) will meet with Mrs. Brink to make an educational plan that will include the type of learning and support that best fits the needs of each individual student. Students may choose from traditional curriculum or HS online. Each student will be responsible for bringing their own computer. This may include online courses, small group lead, individual textbooks, hands-on volunteer hours, work hours, parent lead instruction, hybrid courses from public and BTC, and the like.

Credit hours can be accrued by class time, reading, tests & exams, projects, papers, presentations competitions practice, participation in activities.

Students will be responsible for documenting hours on task, grades received and an organized compilation of papers, presentation, projects, clubs, and awards, by keeping a log sheet of each event.

Graduation Requirements

To graduate, students must complete at least the minimum requirements for their chosen diploma plan. Program descriptions are comparable to those offered in South Dakota public schools. There is no maximum number of credits a student may earn while at BTC. Making a change from a lower degree plan to a higher degree plan may not be permitted due to the amount of make-up work necessary. However, changing from a higher degree plan to a lower degree plan is permissible with parental approval, but is irreversible.

Graduation Ceremony Participation

BTC conducts graduation ceremonies each year in May. To participate in spring graduation, students must have completed sufficient work to be able to complete remaining graduation requirements by the end of the summer following the graduation ceremony. Faculty and administration will determine a student's eligibility to participate by March 1st. All qualifying seniors are invited to participate in our graduation ceremony, including students in the On-Campus and Home Study programs.

Schedules

BTC will be open Monday-Thursday 8:00 am to 3:00 pm. High School students are welcome to come and go with flexibility to their schedule. They will be responsible for providing a schedule to BTC. There will be a designated area for High School students to study. We suggest using your time wisely and not being distracted. We are not a "babysitting" service. We have other students that need our attention too and will expect students to work while they are in our facility.

Employment and Work Credits

BTC recognizes the value of work experience in the lives of our students. With staff approval, older students may secure a job and earn up to two elective credits toward their diploma requirements.

For Work-Study verification, students must provide the school with their paycheck information, listing hours worked, tax deductions, etc. Confidential or sensitive information will be blacked out and photocopies will be made and filed in a secure location as evidence supporting the credibility of Work-Study hours and awarded credit.

Hours must be verified during the last week of each of the four quarterly BTC grading periods. Special circumstances may be considered when requested of BTC in writing. Credit for work is dependent upon the number of hours worked per week (averaged over the nine-week grading period), the successful completion of the duties required while on the job, and turning in the required monthly documentation for credit.

Credit for employment is computed as follows:

- 30 hours per nine-week grading period = 0.25 credit (one credit per year)
 - 60 hours per nine-week grading period = 0.5 credit (two credits per year)
- Two Maximum Elective Credits per Year and Four Total Elective Credits in high school.

Credit for Off-Campus Activities

Since BTC does not offer courses on campus for certain elective and activity courses, credit may be awarded for off-campus activities. Verification must be provided from a sponsor or leader of the activity. In most cases, 54 contact hours = 0.5 credit, graded as a Pass/Fail course. Pass/Fail credits count toward graduation requirements but are not computed in a student's GPA.

Examples include the following:

- ✦ Drivers Education - Completion of course or issuance of driver's license = 0.5 credit. Note: This does not apply to a hardship license where no class time is required.
- ✦ Fine and Performing Arts such as theater, voice, choir, art, ballet, piano, guitar, drums, or other instruments. Documentation is required from the teacher, coach, director, etc.
- ✦ Athletic Participation including hockey, basketball, baseball, softball, rodeo or other equine competitions, tennis, golf, bowling, dance, gymnastics, karate, or fitness center programs.
- ✦ Students interested in participating in athletics can contact Beyond the Classroom and receive credit based on documentation from the coach, trainer, director, etc.
- ✦ Volunteer Service in hospitals, nursing homes, children's shelters, or community centers. Documentation is required.
- ✦ Civic Organizations such as Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Explorer Scouts, etc. Credit is based on documentation by an adult leader or parent of merit badges earned and/or participation in troop activities. Eagle Scout projects may be submitted for 0.5 credit in Teen Leadership.

Dual Credit

Dual Credit courses are accepted for students who have met their requirements. We will assist students on what courses they need to take and how to apply for dual credit. It is the student's responsibility to register and sign up for approved classes.

Section 3 – General Policies

Pandemic, Outbreak, Natural Disaster, and Crisis Response

In the event of pandemic, outbreak, natural disaster, or other unforeseeable crisis, the BTC School Board will prayerfully consider guidelines issued by government officials and relevant government agencies. BTC reserves the right to modify curriculum and resources, schedule, length of school year, teaching methods, and demonstrations of learning as deemed necessary by the BTC Board. Any changes due to pandemic, outbreak, natural disaster, or other unforeseeable crisis do not excuse families from their enrollment contract and tuition obligations.

Emergency Drills, Procedures, & Supplies

We strive to make sure our students are safe at school every day. We do this by making sure that our students are prepared for a variety of emergencies. We will practice fire drills, tornado drills, and earthquake drills. Our classroom is equipped with an emergency backpack. It contains water, prepackaged snacks, gloves, wipes, flashlights, a small first aid kit, hand sanitizer, a copy of our Emergency Response Plan, each student's contact and emergency information, and any lifesaving medication (epi pens, inhalers).

In the event of an emergency, BTC has developed an Emergency Response Plan. Please know that BTC will make every attempt to notify you, so it is vital you keep your emergency contact information up to date.

Ways to Communicate

Each day the students K-8 will carry back and forth a green "Home Folder." Inside it will have a homework sheet to check and sign each night. If you have notes or questions, you can write them on there. We will check them each day. This is where you will also find notes, homework, etc. that we may send home.

We will create an email and text group. We will email weekly updates and/or reminders.

DAILY REMINDERS AND EXPECTATIONS

I. Assignments

Each day the assignments for each grade will be communicated to them. At the end of the school day, we look over those assignments to see what has been completed and what will need to be taken home to be finished.

II. Snacks

Every day after recess/movement break we will read aloud to all the students. The students are welcome to bring a healthy snack which they can eat during this time. Snacks are not required; it is up to individual families whether to bring a snack or not. If you would like to donate healthy snacks for the classroom, we would appreciate that. We would like to encourage healthy snack options not full of sugar. Please see the list of suggestions:

Dried fruit, fruit, cheese, beef sticks/jerky, popcorn, pretzels, veggies, pickles, olives, hard boiled eggs, quesadilla wrap, yogurt, cottage cheese.

III. Water Bottles

RO and ice water are available at the school. Students should bring a water bottle to refill and have readily available.

IV. Tasks

During the day and at the end of the day each student will be responsible for clean-up tasks which keeps our classroom neat and tidy.

V. Show & Tell / Current Events

Throughout the year we may have Show & Tell and Current Events. It is simply telling about an event or object that is of interest to the student; it can also be a world, state, or local current event. This is encouraged, but not mandatory.

Current Events are for grade 4+. They can share one current event per month during Show/Tell time. This is part of their history grade. They will fill out an informational sheet along with sharing their news current event with the class orally.

VI. Snow Day(s)

Calling a "Snow Day" is a difficult decision because we do not have snow days built into our calendar, so we would have to add days to our schedule. Please know that we understand if you do not feel it is safe to bring your children. Usually, if Pierre calls off school, we will as well. Please, keep in touch when the weather is questionable. Each family will be contacted when it is called off. We will NOT make them up unless it is more than three days. Then we will take advantage of our Friday's and /or homework packets.

VII. Conduct

BTC is obviously an unique educational setting and it is deeply embedded in our heart that students (and their teachers) be respectful of others. We learn to be with a small group of individuals, in a small area, all day and all year long which can involve some "trying" moments, but we have wonderful students and the time spent on these "trying moments" is very minimal. However, we do fail at times, and when these incidents happen, an attempt is made to deal with them using Godly wisdom by addressing the issue, asking forgiveness, and humbly accepting the consequences. If the group is not being respectful of rules, more severe than merely talking loudly or not staying on task, or problems occur that we become aware of because a parent or student tells us, these are dealt with on an individual basis, using a variety of consequences depending on the incident, intending for consequences not merely to be dealt out, but lessons learned, apologies given, and forgiveness granted. Our learning environment will be productive, with responsible students who know the importance of honoring the Lord by being respectful, courteous, and obedient.

VIII. School Work

The student's knowledge and ability are expected to be exhibited with cheerfulness, thoughtfulness, and neatness. All schoolwork is expected to be completed, prepared, and presented on time.

Although we do complete a lot of book work, we also do a lot of learning by interacting in various ways through discussion, flashcards, games, drills, research, activities, and projects. We want to work on skills that help us convey our thoughts orally as well as on paper, so keep in mind that students' grades are not just their written work, but participation and attitude during these other various activities is factored into their quarterly grade as well.

Daily work not completed at school is taken home and expected to be completed by the next school day unless students have made other arrangements with me.

IX. Recess-Movement / Sensory Play

Recess and body movement is an important part of our day, not only to get fresh air, move around and be free of work for a few moments, but it builds character. We will be taking advantage of the space we have, we will go outside, and play various movement games.

X. Grading

Students will be graded in various ways such as points, stars, pass, fail. Our goal is to work through each standard until they know it or feel comfortable. On the report card it will be Outstanding, Proficient, Developing, Needs improvement. Standards for each grade and subject will be taught according to the South Dakota State Standards and Department of Education.

XI. Assessments

Assessments will be given three times per year. We use the STAR Reading and Math assessments to compare growth.

XII. Parent-Teacher Conferences / Report Cards

Standard-based report cards will be used quarterly. We will send them home with the students the week following the end of the quarter. If a parent prefers that the report card be given directly to them and not the student, please let us know.

Conferences will be scheduled twice during the school year. The dates are listed on the yearly schedules. Conferences are conducted in the classroom, and it is wonderful if both parent(s) can attend. We will send out a note when the time nears, and you will be able to let me know the time that works best for you. We do have school on conference days as conferences are scheduled during non-school hours.

You are always welcome to call, email, or talk to me about your student any time.

XIII. Absences

If a student is absent due to sickness or unexpected circumstances, they will have two days for each day missed to make-up the work.

If you plan for your student to be absent from school, please notify me with a note, phone call, email, or telling me directly – NOT through your student, as sometimes information is not always relayed accurately. As much work as possible can then be completed before they are absent.

I completely understand when a student needs to be absent for whatever reason, however, please know that being in school involves more than the written work and reading that can be made up. Please take their attendance in school seriously.

XIV. Health Information

Records of current immunizations are a requirement when students enroll for the school program. Generally, these records are transferred from the previous school; however, it is the responsibility of the parent(s) to see that these records are up-to-date. Students who are not able to, or opt out of, an immunization program must submit a letter to BTC stating that their child(ren) is/are not participating in an immunization program. All parents/guardians must complete and return the Medical Consent Form. If your child(ren) requires the administration of any prescription medications while at school, you must complete and return a Prescription Medication Form for each medication. Should students need medical attention while at the school, a staff member will telephone the parent(s), and if necessary, call an ambulance. It is vital that parent(s) provide up-to-date telephone numbers for their places of employment, home, other relatives, and the family physician on the medical consent form that is submitted with the registration form and kept on file in our office.

XV. Field Trips

We will take field trips as they pertain to our learning and towards the end of the school year. We will also have visitors come to share their interests. Please feel free to help set up a field trip or guest speaker if you have any ideas.

XVI. Winter/Spring Programs

We will be hosting a small program that will include talent from the students either musically or academically. We will send a note home regarding details as the time approaches, asking for parental involvement with refreshments, set up and clean up.

XVII. Community Activities

We will try to be involved in community activities such as making cards for the elderly, veterans, and churches.

Every child is unique in their learning styles. Each grade level will be taught through a variety of faith-based resources and materials. We also teach thematically reaching multiple goals across multiple subjects.

Cell Phone and Technology Expectation

Cell phones can be resourceful and distracting. It will be expected from the students that if they bring a cell phone to school that they will place it in the designated basket and will be allowed to check it when they need a break. Students are here to learn, get your tasks done and move on with your day being a productive citizen and student. If we see students are distracted by technology that does not pertain to their curriculum, they will be asked to shut it off or disable it while at BTC.

Other Activities

The high school students will have opportunities but will not be required to participate in most other activities and events along with K-8, such as concerts, holiday parties, etc.

Banned Items

Students are **not** to bring the following to school.

- I-Pod, MP3 player, etc.
- Electronic Game Gear
- Inappropriate magazines or books
- Illegal Drugs/Medication Not Approved By Parents
- Alcohol
- Tobacco, E-cigarettes, vaping equipment
- Matches or Lighters
- Weapons of any type – real or play. Items will be confiscated by the school staff and appropriate disciplinary action will be taken.

Report Cards

Report cards are issued every nine weeks for 1st-12th grades. Numerical grades are given which are based upon tests, quizzes, daily classroom work, projects, and homework. Parents will receive a hard copy sent home with their student(s).

Parent/Teacher Conferences are scheduled in October and February. Parent(s) may also contact their child's teacher at any time to schedule a needed conference.

Encore for 1st-12th grades: Numerical grading scale is used based on effort, attitude, participation, behavior, projects, quizzes, and possible tests.

Dress Code

Students should dress in a conservative manner that demonstrates that attending school is an important function. All clothing should be modest, clean, and well-fitting (not overly loose or tight).

Students should dress comfortably, and wear layered clothing to be prepared for all weather conditions. In cold weather, appropriate winter wear is required, including coat, hat, mittens or gloves, snow pants, and boots. Please label all winter gear.

Playground Rules

- Use the Golden Rule in Matthew 7:12 – No bullying
- Take turns on all equipment
- No throwing rocks, sticks, or snowballs
- No grabbing, hitting, jumping, or pulling on other's clothes
- No using sticks as swords or as weapons
- No "piggyback" or carrying other students
- Line up immediately when teacher blows the whistle

It has been our policy and procedure at BTC to take students outdoors for recess whenever possible. We have not permitted individual students to stay inside because they do not have gloves or hats but have instead used this as reinforcement to help students remember gloves and hats on the next day. It is believed that illnesses and colds are reduced when we can periodically get students outdoors, even if only for a few minutes. Students perform better at school when they can get a little exercise during the school day. Outdoor recess may be cut in half if the temperature with wind chill is around 5-15 degrees, depending on the age level. Inside recess will be given if the temperature with wind chill is around 0 degrees or lower.

BTC Anti-Bullying Policy

Biblical illustration of relationships: John 15:12- “My command is this: Love each other as I have loved you.” And the Matthew 18 Principle

RATIONALE: To instill biblical principles/values and create a more loving environment, our school has adopted this policy. From time to time, conflict can occur. BTC realizes that while bullying may occur, it is never acceptable. We have zero tolerance for such conduct and, consistent with this policy, a true violation will result in appropriate disciplinary action. We seek to implement a clear framework for dealing with bullying incidents in order to protect our students and help the bully learn how to relate in a way that is in line with biblical standards.

DEFINITION: Bullying occurs when a person or group is intimidated, frightened, excluded or hurt by a pattern of behavior directed at them by others. (Greg Griffiths, “Bullying in Schools-The Hidden Curriculum” (2003). **The following actions in an ongoing form may be forms of bullying and are included in all references to “bullying” herein:**

- Physical aggression-including hitting, punching, kicking
- Teasing or verbal abuse-including insults, name calling or racial/sexual remarks
- Intentional exclusion from activities or friendship groups
- The setting up of humiliating experiences
- Damaging a person’s property/possessions or taking them without permission
- Threatening gestures, actions, or words
- Written/verbal/ electronic messages that contain threats, putdowns, gossip or slander
- Cyber bullying through Facebook, texting, tweeting, Instagram or other electronic means

POLICY STATEMENT: From time to time in a community such as a school, conflict and offense can occur. As part of living in a sinful world, bullying can result when we don’t always relate to others as we should or when people try to exert power and influence over others. The school’s response to bullying is based on the pattern of relating to one another found in the Bible. God intended for us to live in a way that acknowledges differences and accepts others because we are all made in God’s image.

Our policy is based on the principle that bullying is “not OK at BTC.” BTC will not tolerate any mean-spirited, unlawful, or disruptive behavior, including any form of bullying, cyber-bullying, or retaliation in our school buildings, on school grounds, in school-related activities, or that occurs outside of school and creates a hostile school environment for the targeted student, staff, or family member(s). We will investigate promptly all reports and complaints of bullying, cyber bullying, and retaliation, and take prompt action to restore a safe learning environment for students and staff who are bullied and prevent further bullying or harassment by those who are identified as perpetrators of bullying.

BTC recognizes that not all inappropriate behaviors should be considered bullying or willful violation of this policy. Behavior will be assessed by the teacher and/or administrator and addressed according to the procedures.

This handbook gives guidelines to be observed by students and parent(s). However, since the school cannot possibly address all potential situations and circumstances in this book, the administration reserves the right to exercise its administrative prerogative in responding to new situations or circumstances. The Administration reserve the right to interpret the written policies of this handbook as it sees fit, and to revise these policies when necessary.

THINGS TO DO BEFORE SCHOOL STARTS

1. Meet with Mrs. Brink if you are in High School, to map out your educational future and curriculum or register for Online High School.
2. If you are NEW to Beyond the Classroom, Inc. - Fill out the Exemption Form and deliver it to the Administrative Office Building or to the Department of Education as soon as possible. If you did this last year, you do NOT need to do it again.
3. Read over the booklet and contact me if you have questions.
4. Buy school supplies – see list on page 23.
5. Fill Out Family Information Sheet
6. Sign permission slips
7. Attend Open House at the classroom, Monday, August 19 at 5:30pm. Please bring all the signed forms and school supplies. We will try to take pictures that night too, so on the first day of school you can just drop off at the door.
